

# 2020 Regional Collaborative Training Systems Approach: Substance Exposed Newborn (SEN)

Three regional trainings will be offered bringing together professionals from multiple disciplines connected to the service delivery continuum for substance exposed newborns, parents with substance use disorders, and families impacted by substance use. To facilitate these regional trainings Department of Human Services, Social Services Administration (SSA) is partnering with Maryland Addiction Consultation Services (MACS), Maryland Patient Safety Center, Maryland Department of Health/Behavioral Health Administration, and National Center on Substance Abuse and Child Welfare.

**Training Purpose:** Intended for Health Care Practitioners, child welfare professionals, community health providers, and behavioral health providers who seek to improve care coordination for substance exposed newborns (including Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome) and parents with opioid and substance use disorders.

## **Target Audience:**

Medical Professionals: OB/GYN, Neonatologist, Midwife, RN

Hospitals: Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) and Case Management

**Child Welfare/Local Department of Social Services (LDSS):** Assistant Director, Program Manager, Unit Manager, or Supervisor (serving SEN or cases with parental substance use)

Local Health Departments: Health Officer, Program Director, and Local Addiction Authority (LAA)

Substance Use Treatment Providers: Director, Assistant Director, and Clinical Manager including Peer Recovery Specialists

## **Objectives:** At the conclusion of this training, participants will:

- 1. Cite the Comprehensive Addictions and Recovery Act (CARA) and Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA) legislation attributed to Maryland's Family Law Article §5-704.2 altering the definition of SEN and reporting requirements by Health Care Practitioners.
- 2. Identify current practice, care, and requirements for promoting the health of substance exposed newborns and parents of substance exposed newborns.
- 3. Explain the clinical management and clinical benefits for treating pregnant and parenting women with opioid use disorder and their newborns.
- 4. Develop a cross-system approach to treating pregnant and parenting women with opioid use disorder and their newborns improving care, practice and safety.
- 5. Create a SEN action plan during teaming sessions to support cross-system collaboration efforts by identifying opportunities for improvement, strategies, and steps to accomplish work.
